

Today, there is a significant shortage of qualified registered nurses. According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, in the coming decade, more new jobs are expected to be created for registered nurses than for any other occupation. In fact, employment of RNs is expected to grow by 22 percent through 2018.

After graduating, Diane taught part-time at FRCC and headed immediately to Metro-

politan State College of Denver and earned her B.S.N. in 1993. "I knew then I wanted to become an educator," she says. She completed her M.S. at the University of Northern Colorado in 1996. Diane was recruited to return to FRCC as a full-time faculty member, joining the Westminster staff in 1998. Today, she is assistant program director. "This is where I began my journey. It is amazing and rewarding to be teaching here now."

"I always wanted to help others, and that's what led me to nursing school," says Janet, a 1998 B.S.N. graduate of the University of Illinois at Chicago and 2002 M.S. graduate of North Park University. During an undergraduate clinical rotation, Janet decided to focus on labor and delivery. She spent seven years at Chicago's Rush Copley Medical Center and Rush University Medical Center, and also taught part-time for one year at Triton College of Nursing. In 2008, Janet moved to Colorado. "FRCC is a wonderful place. We have an amazing faculty that is constantly working to make our program the best in the area. I miss the bedside, but I get to tell my stories now, and I hope students can take that knowledge and use it in whatever work setting they choose."

Options

- Associate of Applied Science Degree – Graduates of the A.A.S. Nursing Program are eligible to apply to take the National Council Licensure Examination for Registered Nurses (NCLEX-RN).
- Licensed Practical Nurse Exit Option – Students may complete the first year of the A.A.S. Nursing Program and NUR 169 to receive a certificate and be eligible to apply to take the National Council Licensure Examination for Practical Nurses (NCLEX-PN).
- Nursing Advanced Placement Bridge Program (LPN to ADN) – The Bridge Program allows Licensed Practical Nurses to complete the transition course (NUR 189) and enter the second year of the A.A.S. Nursing Program. Graduates are eligible to apply to take the NCLEX-RN.
- RN to BSN 2+2 Program – Registered Nurses with associate degrees can earn a Bachelor of Science in Nursing from Metropolitan State College of Denver. Take your classes at the Westminster Campus.

Learn from great instructors

Our Nursing faculty are master's-degree-prepared educators who have worked in the field and are now eager to share their knowledge with students. They have stories to tell that help students get a sense of what nursing work is actually like. And with small class sizes and hands-on learning experiences at clinical sites, you'll gain plenty of personal attention and interaction.

Ana Maria came to the United States in 1993—after three years of medical school in her native Colombia.
