FOREIGN LANGUAGE & CULTURE

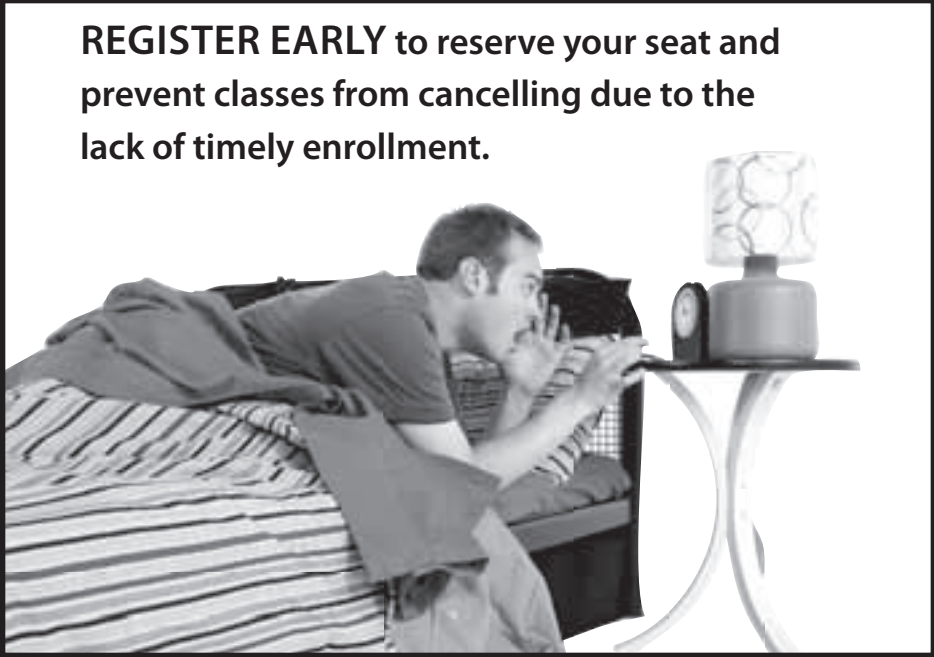
