FRCC Foundation Receives \$150,000 Matching Challenge from Colorado Department of Higher Education

Foundation donors have unlocked half of a \$150,000 matching challenge from the state Department of Higher Education.

When notified of the challenge last fall, the Foundation sent a fundraising letter to over 1,300 individuals asking for donations, emphasizing Olivia's story, and the importance of Foundation scholarships.

Thanks to donor generosity, we are halfway to the goal.

The Department of Higher Education's Colorado Opportunity Scholarship Initiative committed about \$725,000 in matching scholarship funding to the College Community College System this year for distribution among the state's community colleges. As the largest community college in Colorado, FRCC received \$150,000.

Larimer Campus \$32 Million Renovation in Final Phase

With two construction and renovation phases completed at the Larimer Campus, Mount Antero is next in line for expansion and renovation.

The new Mount Antero will have more space for student services and activities. The building is expected to include veterans services; more student meeting and gathering space, online learning, fiscal services; testing, counseling, and the registrar's office.

The first phase of the \$32 million project was the construction of Little Bear Peak, which opened in January 2014 and houses Automotive Technology, Manufacturing and Energy Technology, and Welding Technology.

In the second phase, completed in 2015, Veterinary Technology and Forestry, Wildlife, and Natural Resources moved to new quarters in Blanca Peak, and Redcloud Peak became an arts and design center, housing Art, Music, Theater, Dance, CAD, Humanities, Interior Design, Multimedia Technology, and Architectural Engineering and Building Science.

The Markley family, which has been in the auto business for almost 80 years, has pledged \$100,000 in support of the Larimer Campus Automotive Technology Program. The gift to the Foundation will provide funds for both a strong and expanding automotive program and scholarships for its students.

Forney Industries is a valued partner of the Welding Technology Program. The company supports scholarships for welding students, with the goal of graduating skilled workers that

Hungry and in College

It's hard to learn on an empty stomach.

That's why a food pantry has opened on the Larimer Campus, and other FRCC campuses are researching options to do the same.

A recent survey of FRCC students found that 43 percent reported being hungry in the past year. Thus, Food For Thought opened in a small building on the Larimer Campus.

It's not easy, opening and running a food pantry. The champions of Food

For Thought brought its idea under the nonprofit umbrella of the FRCC Foundation. A partnership was needed with the Food Bank for Larimer County, and volunteers transport food from the food bank to campus. The Facilities Department had to bring the Food For Thought building up to food-storage standards. Volunteers tend a campus garden that adds fresh vegetables at harvest time to supplement other food sources.

A national survey parallels what FRCC found with its own survey. The national survey found that one in five community college students said they had gone hungry in the past 30 days because of a lack of money.

Thirteen percent had experienced homelessness. More than half were at risk of homelessness. A majority had financial aid and jobs, but it was not enough.

In an opinion piece published in the *New York Times*, the researchers emphasized that "such high rates of food and housing insecurity among hard-working college students indicate that the nation faces a serious crisis. Much of the conversation in Washington concerning college costs—whether it's about simplifying the financial aid application or refinancing student loans—seems almost trivial in comparison with the problems these students face."
