FRCC apologizes for any inconvenience due to the following changes.

**Art:** ART 151 Painting I: Should read Recommended Preparation ART 131, instead of Prerequisite ART 131.

**Biology:** The second BIO 112 listed in the Course Description section is incorrect. The first BIO 112 listed is correct.

**Early Childhood Education:** Prerequisites

ECE 101 Introduction to Early Childhood Education: Prerequisites: Completion of ENG 060 or higher or equivalent placement test scores and REA 060 or higher or equivalent placement test scores.

ECE 102 Introduction to Early Childhood Lab Techniques: Prerequisites: Completion of ENG 060 or higher or equivalent placement test scores and REA 060 or higher or equivalent placement test scores, and ECE 101. ECE 101 may be taken concurrently.

ECE 103 Guidance Strategies for Children: Prerequisites: Completion of ENG 060 or higher or equivalent placement test scores and REA 060 or higher or equivalent placement test scores.

ECE 238 Child Growth and Development: Prerequisites: Completion of ENG 060 or higher or equivalent placement test scores and REA 060 or higher or equivalent placement test scores.

**Engineering Technology:** ENT 120 Statistical Process Control. Credit hours should be 3 instead of 2.

**Energy:** ENY 101, 122, 160, 235 and 280 are not GT-SC1 courses.

**Geography:** GEO 112 should be a GT-SC1 course with 4 credits, not a GT-SS1 course with 3 credits in the Colorado Guaranteed Transfer Program for General Education.

**Geology:** GEY 135 Environmental Geology is a 4 hour course (not 3). It is also a GT-SC1 course.

**Health Information Technology:** The title for HIT 231 should be ICD Coding III.

## MAT 155 & 156

The statement in the catalog that a student must take both MAT 155 and 156 to apply either to an AGS degree is deleted. These two courses are also added to the general electives lists for the AA and AS degrees.

## SCI 155 & 156

The following statement *"Note: Students who choose to take either SCI 155 or SCI 156 must complete both classes to meet GT-SC1 requirements for the AA degree"* in the catalog for Natural and Physical Sciences requirements for all AA and AS degrees should be disregarded. This only applies to the transfer agreements for Early Childhood Education and Elementary Education.

## Heating, Ventilation & Air Conditioning - Associate of Applied Science Degree

Code: F\_AAS\_HVA Campus: Larimer

This program provides training in basic through advanced heating, ventilation, air conditioning, and refrigeration. Other topics in the program include: basic electricity and electrical components for HVACR, refrigerant tubing, fabrication, soldering, brazing, and trouble shooting, plus residential and commercial heating, hot water heating, industrial controls, advanced troubleshooting, customer service, teamwork, and communication.

All courses applied to the degree or certificate must be completed with a grade of "C" or above.

Assessment testing is required for all students. Students who place in ENG 090 (or above), MAT 090 (or above), and REA 090 may begin this program of study. Students scoring below this level should consult with a faculty member before registering for courses in this program of study. Students must complete the Industry Competency Exams (ICE) Residential Air Conditioning and Heating, Light Commercial Air Conditioning and Heating, and Commercial Refrigeration as a requirement for this AAS degree. Cost of each section of the ICE Exam is \$30.00. Students need to sign up with the Testing Center before taking this exam and pay for the exam at the time of testing.

## ACC - Enrolled Agent Certificate

Code: F\_CER\_ENRA Campus: Boulder County, Larimer, Westminster and Online

This accounting certificate allows students to gain the necessary practical skills needed to study for and take the IRS Special Enrollment Examinations. An enrolled agent is certified by the IRS to perform income tax preparation for individuals, corporations, estates, and trusts.

In consultation with an accounting faculty advisor, this certificate can be tailored to meet the needs of students who have already achieved significant knowledge and skills in tax preparation.

The program assumes that students have previous knowledge and skill in basic computer applications in a Microsoft Windows operating environment. Students without prior computer experience should remedy any computer deficiencies before beginning the certificate course of study.

Consulting with an accounting faculty advisor is strongly recommended before beginning the enrolled agent certificate program.

## VET - Veterinary Technician Assistant Certificate

The Veterinary Technician Assistant certificate program provides training in veterinary health and handling of a variety of domestic and exotic species, with the focus on tasks for assisting the Veterinary Technician and Veterinarians. Veterinary Technician Assistants do not diagnose animal illnesses, prescribe treatment, or perform surgery. Eleven credit hours of course work are required before the student may complete a 2-credit, 72-hour private-practice internship. This program provides an introduction to the field of veterinary medicine, but is not intended to provide admission to a college of veterinary medicine.

To enter the program, students must meet the following admission requirements:

1. Completion of a high school diploma or GED
  2. Achievement of indicated assessment scores or completion of preparatory course work.
  3. Completion of high school level biology or BIO 105 or BIO 111 with a grade of "C" or above (no more than seven years old)
  4. Completion of HPR 178 Medical Terminology (1 credit), with a grade of "C" or above.
  5. Completion of a Veterinary Technician Assistant intent to enroll application form available at the Larimer Campus.
- Admission to the program is limited to the first 12 students who have submitted the appropriate admission materials. Students must be admitted to the Veterinary Technician Assistant program in order to take the curriculum courses as shown below. All courses must be completed with a grade of "C" or above prior to graduation.

Please note: Students transferring to a University of Colorado institution (Boulder, Colorado Springs, Denver) must satisfy the CU System's MAPS (Minimum Academic Preparation Standards) requirement.

Only courses with grades of C- or above are guaranteed to transfer.

Admission to a receiving institution does not guarantee enrollment in a specific degree program. Some programs of receiving institutions have controlled entry due

either to space limitations or academic requirements.

The credit and course transfer guarantees described in this agreement apply to the specific degree program covered by this agreement. Receiving institutions will evaluate application of the courses designated in this agreement to other degree program on a course-by-course basis. The receiving institution will accept all applicable credits earned within ten years of transfer to the receiving institution. These courses are guaranteed to transfer with you and count toward your general education core or graduation requirements for most, but not all, associate's or bachelor's degree programs. If you completed a course before it became effective as a gtPathways course, the institution to which you transfer has the option to accept it or not accept it. ## COLORADO GUARANTEED TRANSFER PROGRAM FOR GENERAL EDUCATION (gtPathways)

After starting on your higher education pathway at any public college or university in Colorado, and, upon acceptance to another, you can transfer up to **31 credits** of successfully (C- or above) completed gtPathways (general education) coursework. These courses are guaranteed to transfer with you and count toward your general education core or graduation requirements for most, but not all, associate's or bachelor's degree programs. If you completed a course before it became effective as a gtPathways course, the institution to which you transfer has the option to accept it or not accept it. For more information and the most updated list of gtPathways courses, including dates when individual courses became effective, visit <http://higher.ed.colorado.gov/Academics/Transfers/gtPathways/curriculum.html>. Guaranteed transfer courses that are not offered by FRCC, but are taken at other Colorado institutions, may apply to the appropriate GT category under Required General Education Courses.

If you complete an Associate of Arts or Associate of Science degree, 60 credits are guaranteed to transfer to a four-year school, once you are accepted for admission. You should be able to finish a bachelor's degree within another 60 credits. This is called a 60+60 transfer plan. Please note that some majors at the four-year schools require specific courses that must be completed as part of the A.A. or A.S. degree. Note also that some majors may exceed the typical 120 credits required to graduate. ### Additional notes regarding transfer:

**Transferring credit to FRCC:** Transfer courses will be evaluated for FRCC course equivalency and applied to degree requirements according to state and college policy. Completion of FRCC equivalent guaranteed transfer (gt) course requirements from any regionally accredited institution will meet FRCC degree requirements.

**Credit for Prior Learning:** Credit earned through prior learning methodologies (including CLEP, Advanced Placement, International Baccalaureate, articulation, military, corporate, challenge exam, portfolio credit, substitutions, correspondence courses, or independent study) may meet FRCC degree requirements. A student who is awarded credit using standardized credit for prior learning assessments may be granted a degree with designation & a gt Pathways notation on their CCCS transcript. The receiving Colorado public institution will be obligated to honor the promise that completion of the AA/AS with designation and/or gt Pathway curriculum fulfills the lower division requirements as defined by the statewide articulation agreement. The receiving institution will evaluate those credits according to its standard policy. Students who wish to use credits awarded by exam to fulfill specific course requirements are responsible for consulting with the institution to which they are considering transferring to determine whether the credits they have been awarded by exam meet the standards of the receiving institution for specific course equivalents.

Generally, credits accepted in transfer will be less than 10 years old, though all credit which is not outdated or obsolete, and is applicable to the student's degree program, may be accepted. The final determination of acceptance of credit based on content and age of the credit is made by the appropriate college instructional department and instructional dean.
